HOLY WEEK SERVICES

EASTER VIGIL will begin following the Good Friday Service and continue until Easter Dawn. (**There is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board in the hall.**) This has been an unforgettable experience for those who have participated - especially in the middle of the night!

EASTER SUNRISE SERVICE will be at 6 AM at the Grist Mill Pond.

EASTER CELEBRATION SERVICES: MARCH 27TH at 9:00AM and 10:30AM Trumpet, Organ and Timpani play ten minutes before the services begin. Sacred Dance processional and Children's Choir sings. All children begin in church and pre-school through 5th graders are invited (*unless parents want them to remain in worship*) to move to the Hall for special event.



Some Facts About Lent

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday. That day is so named because in the early church ashes were sprinkled on the heads of penitent Christians.

This custom remains today and is becoming more wide spread in the Protestant Churches. The sign of the cross on forehead or in the palm of the hand symbolizes our being open to God and offering ourselves with clean hearts before our God.

The color for Lent is purple, reminding us of Lent's penitential mood.

Lent lasts forty days, until Easter. but if you count the days from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday, you get 46. That's because Sundays are excluded from the count (and from Lent). They are designed as "feast days," commemorating the <u>resurrection</u>.

The origin of the word LENT is the Anglo-Saxon word, LENCTEN, meaning "spring", the time when the days lengthen.

In some families there is the tradition of "giving up" something for Lent. That evolved from the idea that Lent was a period of fasting in preparation for baptism which was observed on Easter Eve.

Thankfully, most of us have progressed from the idea of "giving up" (Self denial) to the idea of "taking on" for the good of others.

There are many ways Christians benefit from Lent today. The season encourages us to set aside time for quiet contemplation...to read, meditate, and pray; to reflect on the direction of our own personal lives and on the meaning of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

It reminds us that we are a part of a community of faith that makes a profound difference in our lives and in the way we reach out to those near at hand as well as those on the other side of the world.

In short, Lent is a time to reflect on the relationship between our lives and our faith, between Jesus' journey and our own.

IT'S YOUR CORNERSTONE FUND!!



Over 20 years ago our wider church family, the United Church of Christ, created a new mission: an investment and loan fund to serve the churches and agencies of the United Church of Christ. Individual church members and churches themselves were invited to make an investment ... a Certificate of Deposit (CD) of any amount of money (\$500 – \$50,000 -- Current rate 2%-3%) for a period of time (6 months to 5 years) and receive interest on their investment.

The investments from church members and churches are pooled and loaned at a reasonable rate to churches that seek to renovate or expand facilities or do new ministry with their loans. The Cornerstone Fund now totals 56M dollars in 205 loans (from \$20,000 – 5M dollars) and there are over 2700 investors at the present time. The Cornerstone Fund also helps churches refinance loans at lower rates saving the churches money.

UCC CONFERENCE NEWS

"Therefore be it resolved that the Board of Directors of the RI, MA and CT Conference UCC commits to joining with the other two UCC Conferences in Southern New England to issue a common invitation to the pastors, leaders and congregations of our three Conferences to use 2015-2016 program year as a "season of Discernment' as we listen to how God may be calling our three Conferences over 2016-2017calendar yes to either federate or merge. We do this seeking to advance the mission of the UCC in Southern New England and beyond, and as a sign of faithfulness to God's call.

In compliance with this charge the RI Conference has scheduled a series of regional meetings. On January 31st 2015 the East Bay congregations: Hope, Riverside, Newman, Seekonk and Sheldon Street) met at Hope Congregational Church UCC 40 persons attended this meeting, with Seekonk being very well represented.

The Rev. Dr. George Peters, RI Board of Directors President opened the meeting with prayer and went on to explain the intent of these regional meetings:

- 1) to reach out to the local membership of the churches in the RI Conference UCC
- 2) to listen to the questions, concerns and observations concerning the proposed possible merger of the 3 Conferences (RI, MA, CT)
- 3) to stress that these discussions were a 'work in progress'. Nothing was 'cast in stone' at this juncture
- 4) recommended reading UCC General Minister and President Rev. John Dorhauer's book "Beyond Resistance: The Institutional Church meets the Postmodern World" (paperback/Amazon) discusses changes and challenges of today's church.

The Rev. Barbara J. Libby, Interim Conference Minister opened up the meeting for questions and observations which she tabulated and which will be 'pooled' with those from other regional meetings.

At random, some of these questions:

- 1) Why / How? Some other UCC Conferences are collapsing their leadership due to decreasing revenues and need to reduce costs. General Synod did invite Conferences to consider re-thinking boundaries
- 2) how many Association Area Ministers are there currently in MA/CT? CT has 4 and MA has 5. RI has 1 Conference Minister.
- 3) might sharing staff save all 3 Conference money?
- 4) The Rev. Dr. Daehler Hayes suggested years ago that 'Doing Together What We Cannot Do alone' and the question arose: Isn't this what is being proposed?
- 5) Several examples of successful collaboration between our Conferences already are:
- * for at least 5-6 years New England has focused together on the environment
- *RI, MA and CT Boards have met once and are scheduled to meet again this May 2016 – learning about one another and what is happening in the 3 Conferences
- * Better connectivity has already enhanced a number of training opportunities for pastors as well as 'Super Saturdays' which provides sharing resources for all three Conferences.
- 6) Other options as we move forwards include:
- *Combining Churches closing some and re-purposing buildings
- *Interdenominational collaborations
- 7) Focus on 'Community Building' Some churches feel isolated
