Donna Euell – continued providing us her weekly announcements as well as helping to coordinate when to video each week.

And, while we are acknowledging people, we thank Pat Martin for her six years of service as not only a Deacon, but also as the secretary for each meeting. Taking her place this year, we are very happy to welcome Bonnie DeBlois the Board of Deacons. What is a PLEDGE?

It is filling out a card(agreement) to promise a certain amount of money to the church regularly on a weekly or monthly basis.

Why do we pledge? The church has a budget for programs, supplies, utilities, staff salaries, buildings and grounds upkeep, curriculum, etc. and counts on regular giving to pay the expenses to operate a vital church community. Without pledges we cannot create a budget.

How much 'should' I pledge?

This decision is between you and God! The scriptures say that in biblical times a 'tithe' was 10% but a modern tithe could be 5% as we give to other areas of need as well. Some members consider starting @ 1% of their income and try to raise it each year. A fair way is to give the percentage that is possible given your income.

How do I pledge?

What is our GOAL?
