Some Facts About Lent

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday. That day is so named because in the early church ashes were sprinkled on the heads of penitent Christians.

This custom remains today and is becoming more wide spread in the Protestant Churches. The sign of the cross on forehead or in the palm of the hand symbolizes our being open to God and offering ourselves with clean hearts before our God.

The color for Lent is purple, reminding us of Lent's penitential mood.

Lent lasts forty days, until Easter. but if you count the days from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday, you get 46. That's because Sundays are excluded from the count (and from Lent). They are designed as "feast days," commemorating the <u>resurrection</u>.

The origin of the word LENT is the Anglo-Saxon word, LENCTEN, meaning "spring", the time when the days lengthen.

In some families there is the tradition of "giving up" something for Lent. That evolved from the idea that Lent was a period of fasting in preparation for baptism which was observed on Easter Eve.

Thankfully, most of us have progressed from the idea of "giving up" (Self denial) to the idea of "taking on" for the good of others.

There are many ways Christians benefit from Lent today. The season encourages us to set aside time for quiet contemplation...to read, meditate, and pray; to reflect on the direction of our own personal lives and on the meaning of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

It reminds us that we are a part of a community of faith that makes a profound difference in our lives and in the way we reach out to those near at hand as well as those on the other side of the world.

In short, Lent is a time to reflect on the relationship between our lives and our faith, between Jesus' journey and our own.

Are you ready for it? The last day of March (31st) is Easter Sunday. Yes, if you have younger children, this is also the morning you put out goodies, claiming it was the Easter Bunny!

As most of you know, Easter is not just one day, but rather a season, beginning with Ash Wednesday and the start of the Easter and Lenten season. And of interest this year is that we got to celebrate both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day on the same day!

FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Weather has inhibited progress on assessing reported roof leaks that occurred during a January storm. You may recall from our last report that leaks were noticed above the Memorial Room in the church and outside of Room 3 in the Gardiner Building. We also have a damaged exterior light on the Gardiner Building. It was damaged when a tree fell on the building earlier in the season.

In addition to keeping you apprised of our campus status, we intend to share our financial status.

At the end of December, our year-to-date budget deficit was -\$6845.00. In January our income diminished, and we had some big expenses. Our current budget deficit is -\$20936.00. Part of the reason for this amount is due to periodic payments (ie. insurance, workers compensation, snow removal).

As of this writing we experienced another storm which required snow removal. We estimate that we have exceeded our snow-removal budget by about \$2000.00+.

There were also some utility increases. An avoidable increase is that of needless heating. We try to ensure that the Church and Gardiner Building are comfortable during times when the buildings are in use. Thermostats have been programmed to heat the buildings during times of occupancy.

Very recently, a thermostat in the hall was found set at 68 degrees over many unoccupied time periods. Although we would prefer thermostats not to be changed, we understand that there may be times when the heat needs to be temporarily adjusted. The key to temporary adjustments is to avoid placing the adjustment on HOLD. Temporary adjustments maintain temperature settings for an hour or so and then allow the thermostat to return to its schedule. Placing a thermostat on HOLD causes the system to maintain the chosen temperature until it is placed back on schedule. We cannot account for why programming would be changed on a thermostat as previously described but we do know it is expensive.

If you have any questions or recognize a problem on our campus, please contact a Trustee. Messages to us could also be relayed via Maria Tavares in the office.
