#### From the Interim Pastor

#### **COMMUNICATION IS KEY**



For me, the hardest part of being a human being is communicating with other human beings who think differently than I do. I continue to be a student of communication as I seek to both understand others and to be understood, not necessarily for the purpose of agreement in all things but particularly for the purpose of collaboration. You know as well as I do that many elements are factors in our ability to communicate well: personality, experience, education, language, trust, power dynamics, etc. To be willing to work through those factors to build good channels of communication is to have a heart for people in all our intrinsic messiness and loveliness.

I think ultimately that's why God came to us in human form. How else could the Supreme Ruler of the Universe actually come to understand the finite existence of humanity but to live as one of us, from birth to death, through the terrible twos, the threenage and teenage years, and into what at the time was middle age? It's one thing to call a shepherd to lead his people to freedom from the depths of a burning bush. It's another thing to call generations of people to the hard work of loving one another unless one had "been there, done that" and knew for real what the ask is. God through Jesus Christ knows....and even after living in human company, continues to ask us to love not just our groups but our enemies, as well.

I do wish the Bible had a bit more information about how *to communicate* that we're trying to love our enemies, though. Maybe that would make it easier to love them, if we could say to them, "We love you. We want what's best for you and for all of us. We don't need to be in conflict" in ways that actually get through to those who hate us.

Of course, it would be nice if we could say the same thing to those we love with whom we're in conflict, as well. I find it both sad and ironic that churches are often where small communications failures lead to the worst conflict because such failures are very rarely intentional. Someone gets copied on an email they shouldn't have been and a private matter becomes known because the one who received it accidentally perceives it to now be common knowledge. Someone doesn't get copied on an email they should have received and they vent about it to someone who publicly blows it out of proportion. Someone overhears part of a conversation and doesn't understand the context, then goes to get clarification from someone who wasn't party to that original conversation. Rumors fly, feelings get hurt, people take sides, and soon there's a big mess where a simple apology or a clarification with the right person could have solved the whole thing.

Another flavor of church conflict is the type that arises when one or two people skip the board/committee/team process and take upon themselves something that should be addressed by a board or committee or team. This can result in confusion, irritation, hard feelings, and even retaliation. That's not to say that boards, committees, and teams can't empower people to take action, of course; it's simply to say that such groups exist for a reason and going through the proper channels to get something done is almost always the best way. It also means that those groups can't dither about decisions, which can be yet another flavor of conflict in churches.

I bring this up because we are embarking on the profile writing journey and it's vital that the profile be as honest and appealing as possible. There is not a church on this planet that does not have some level of conflict, yet it's the rare congregation that will acknowledge its presence unless the conflict has been destructive. When I was seeking settled pastoral roles, I immediately dumped any profile that denied conflict; I think most of my colleagues would do the same. We want to be able to ask about how conflict is handled and what the congregation has learned about navigating conflict together, which is easier to do when a profile identifies the level of conflict and provides examples of resolutions to previous conflicts or says that the church has learned to live with the tension.

When we gather after worship on April 27 for the first congregational story collecting event, you'll be asked to share honestly and thoughtfully about your experiences of the congregation and the programs of the church—the great, the good, the not-so-great, and even the conflicts that you might have been involved in as well as how those conflicts have been resolved (or not). If you'd rather share your story in a smaller group, members of the Profile Team will be able to facilitate that later in the spring or summer.

In all of these things, communication is key. A good profile relies on good communication from the congregation to the team as much as on the team's ability to tell a compelling story in writing. Much conflict can be resolved when those involved are willing to listen to each side and come up with a solution that meets the needs of all involved. Much more can be avoided, or at least minimized, by communicating first and keeping the channels of communication open all the time.

Like God has. From the Garden of Eden to the burning bush, from the cross on Calvary to the winds of Pentecost, and from the *Mayflower* to Seekonk, God is still communicating with us, calling us to love and serve even our enemies. Maybe it's enough to confuse them with our love until we learn to speak with them in love...

## FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

On the chance you did not know, our buildings undergo periodic inspections. suppression system in our range hood is inspected annually. A new requirement for the range hood is that it must be cleaned twice a year in order to attain certification for use (You'll now notice an inspection sticker on the side of the hood). Such a requirement is based on use and the amount of people served per year.

Our buildings are inspected twice a year by the fire department, and they are also inspected by the town building department. Recent inspections identified the need to replace batteries in several exit signs as well as a battery in an emergency lighting system. We also had to move items away from exit points in the church, thus the reason chairs are being moved away from the glass doors in the church's Memorial Room and items removed from under stairways.

A significant change in the church regards the lift. Continuous repair needs, absent a funding source, led to its decommissioning. Much thought and discussion occurred before taking this action. Fortunately, the Gardiner Building provides us the opportunity to conduct events that are accessible to all.

We had to have a plumber fix a few plumbing issues in the past two months. We still have an issue with a heating pipe in the church basement.

Bids are being sought to install split unit air conditioning in the Memorial Room. Split units are being sought as they are about half the price of installing a new central air system. In attaining the bids, we learned that the existing church systems are about 20 years old. Unlike previously mentioned repairs, the split unit project will be paid for by a very generous donor.

Coming soon, new room numbers will be posted in the Gardiner Building. You will also see room numbers and door numbers outside of the building. This is being done to improve safety in the Gardiner Building and to facilitate public safety personnel when responding to an emergency.

We are very appreciative of Trish Sweeney's efforts to organize a spring clean up day. Thanks, also, to volunteers that endured some chilly weather to clean up around our campus. trailer loads of leaves and branches were gathered and disposed of at a composting site.

As always, if you see something that needs attention, please notify Maria in the office or the Trustee of the Month (May - Craig Mace, June - Tony Sousa). If you would like to tackle a project, please let us know. We would be happy to have the help.
